



The Larry Steeb Meet of Champions is selective in those athletes participating and reminiscent of the old county honor roll meets. Athletes had to meet a certain high standard in an event in order to participate. There were 42 teams total with 26 Division I schools, 10 Division II schools, and 6 Division III & IV Schools represented. There were a number of top level track & field athletes in the greater Ann Arbor area who competed at this meet. To compete at the meet was an honor and to place in the top six places was ex-

We continued to make the most out of the situation and compete hard. This meet was a good preparation for the MHSAA D2 State Meet on Saturday, June 1st, held at Hamilton High School.

• Anna Brant placed 5th in the shot put throw with a distance of 35' 7".

Anna will be heading to compete in

the State Meet in this event on Saturday.

- Kennedy Anderson placed 6th in the high jump at a height of 4' 10", which she did on her first attempt. Kennedy continues to flirt with clearing the 5' 0" barrier, which she missed barely a couple of times. Kennedy will be an important leader in this event for the team next season.
- Senior Madeline Collins competed in the long jump for the last time for Chel-Although she sea. was not top six, she did jump her season best with a distance of 15' 0.75". We are proud of Madeline's contributions to the team in this event and as a captain on the team. She will head to Michigan State to study medicine and compete in competitive cheer.
- The 4x800m relay team composed of Ceci Bayer, Madison Morgan, Sofia DeMea, and Natalia DeMea continued to improve on their time. Each member of the team ran solid splits to place 3rd overall with a season best time of 10:00.24.
- Leila Wells placed 1st in the 100m hurdles with a season best time of 14.98, which is very close to her PR and her school record (i.e.,two hundredths of a second). She will be competing at the State Meet in this event and she is looking forward to repeating her recent efforts there.
- Aleeah Wells placed 6th overall in the 100m hurdles with a time of 16.53 (a big meets with fast PR). Aleeah was very close to qualifying for be competing at the the State Meet. She State Meet individuwas in 2nd for most of ally in the 100m and

- The 4x100m relay composed of Leila Wells, Aleeah Wells, Teagan Hill, and Carley Grabarczyk placed 4th overall with a time of 50.60. This team is close to the school record based on their best time of the season and are looking good going into the State to place in the top 8 as well.
- Carley Grabarczyk (12.65) and Teagan Hill (13.10) placed 4th and 6th, respectively, in the 100m dash. Both athletes continued their high placing in times. Carley will

200m dashes. Carley will also anchor the 4x100m relay, while Teagan will be competing in three relays, specifically, the 4x100m, 4x200m, and 4x400m relays.

- Ceci Bayer ran a fast 800m split in the 4x800m relay (2:25) and repeated a similar performance in the open 800m run with a time of 2:25.55 (a PR). With her performance, she is within a half of second of the top 10 all-time record in this event.
- Other Larry Steeb Meet of Champion qualifiers were the following: Claire Ash in the discus throw, Karlie VanRemortel in pole vault, India Barney and Caitlyn Jbara both in the 100m hurdles, and Addie Howard and Brinna Wenzel both in the 4x400m relay.

On Saturday (6/1), the Girls Track & Field Team, 14 athletes traveled to strong, Hamilton High School for the MHSAA DII Championship Meet. This is the largest group we have brought to the State Meet. There were 139 teams who participated in the State Meet with weather conditions in the low 70s with a southeast wind and rain in the afternoon (heavy at times). Chelsea placed 12th overall (actually a twoway tie) out of 67 scoring teams. We were All-State in two events, specifically Leila Wells was the State Champion in the 100m hurdles and the 4x100m relay placed 3rd overall. This team handled the intensity and pressure of the State Meet with maturity and grace, resulting in personal records, season bests, school records, top placing, and memora-

• Junior Anna Brant returned to the State Meet ranked #19 out of 24 shot put throwers. She was able to throw 36' 6.5" on

her last throw, which was a 5" improvement from her Regional throw of 36' 1.5". Anna placed 13th out of 23 throwers in the State Meet. Anna has continued to improve this season on her shot put throwing and the lay team composed coaches are sure she is ready to take it to the next level in the 2025 season. Anna is number two all time in the shot put for Chelsea with her throw of 38' 10.5" this season.

- Sophomore Karlie VanRemortel qualified for the first time for the State Meet this season. She vaulted 9' 3" and placed 19th out of 26 jumpers. Karlie is 10th all time in the pole vault for Chelsea with her height of 9'9". Karlie is a hard worker and coaches are excited to see her back next season and try for a top eight placing.
- Sophomore Lissa Krueger qualified for the first time for the State Meet this season as well. Lissa kicked off the meet for Chelsea with a PR at a height of 8' 9". Lissa finished 24th (a four-way tie) out of 26 athletes in a highly competitive

field. Lissa has improved tremendously from the start of the season. I am sure she will have an itch to return to the State Meet with her teammates next season.

• The 4x800m re-

- of Ceci Bayer (sophomore), Madison Morgan (senior), Sofia DeMea (junior), and Natalia DeMea (junior) ran their third fastest time of the season 10:05.97 and placed 18th out of 25 teams. They beat their seed by four places. Coaches are proud of this group continuing to improve throughout the season and be flexible with the lineup. We wish our senior Madison Morgan all the best with continuing to compete at the next level at Lake Superior State University in running. She will be missed by the team due to the depth she provides for our distance lineups and her leadership.
- Senior Leila Wells was crowned State Champion in the 100m hurdles with a convincing win in the finals. Leila also

broke her school record in the event with a time of 14.92 FAT into a headwind. (Her previous record was 14.96 FAT.). Leila was ranked 5th heading into the meet. Leila led off the 4x100m and 4x400m relays, which also performed very well. She is going to play basketball at Virginia Tech University next year. Her impact and leadership on the team will be missed.

• Senior Carley Grabarczyk placed 9th out of 30 sprinters. Carley was ranked #13 going into the State Meet in the 100m dash and ran well going into a headwind in her semi-final race. She had a dramatic photo finish with Meghan Koss of Dearborn Divine Child who just barely out leaned her. She missed the finals (All-State honors) by a thousandths of a second. Also, Carley competed in the 200m dash and placed 12th out of 31 sprinters with a time of 25.78 seconds. (She was ranked 23rd out of 33 heading into the meet.) This was her second

son, which is an outstanding performance due to the headwind that sprinters had on Saturday. Carley also anchored the 4x100m relay, which placed 3rd overall. Carley is a tough competitor and one of most valuable athletes on our team. We will miss her role on the team and leadership. She will be competing at the next level at Purdue University Northwest in Hammond, Indiana.

• The 4x200m relay team composed of Leila Wells (senior), Aleeah Wells (a freshman), Howard Addie sophomore), and Teagan Hill (a freshman) were ranked 18th out of 33 teams entering the State Meet. With a strong lead off by Leila, they placed 13th out of 33 teams who competed with a time of 1:42.46 (a PR). The relay seemed to level up in their competitiveness and determination in the race. It will be fun to watch these talented younger sprinters, specifically Addie, Aleeah, and Teagan in these next two to three years. I am sure they will be

hungry to return to the State Meet individually and on sprint relays.

• The 4x400m relay team composed of Addie Howard, Brinna Wenzel, Ceci Bayer, and Teagan Hill placed 23rd out of 30 teams with a time of 4:15.72 (the team's 3rd fastest time of the season). This relay team did well as a group with a long wait time to race and adjusted well with two other runners filling in. Specifically, Addie and Brinna, both sophomores have been the backbone of the relay team and continued to run fast splits, while Ceci (a sophomore) and Teagan (a freshman) were put in the lineup to fill in for Sam Bieber and Caitlyn

Ash who had conflicts on the day of the State Meet. Both girls ran well with Ceci having one of her fastest splits of the season. We look forward to these young ladies making it back to the State Meet to place in the top eight.

Chelsea History Museum Walks Back to Era of Taverns, **Pubs, and Prohibition**

Chelsea may be famous for Jiffy Mix, the Purple Rose Theatre, and its thriving art and restaurant scene, but there's more to the city's story.

The Chelsea Area Historical Society's wildly popular walking tour -- "Boozy History of Chelsea: Saloons, Pubs & Bars," -- returns this year on Saturdays, June 15 and 22.

Tour leader and organizer, Jasen King, is excited about the museum's new "pub crawl." Working with former board member Cary Church's research and museum volunteer Mary Keaton, he found a deep well of stories dating from the 1850s through the 1990s, highlighting a wild and free-flowing past filled with political intrigue, gambling, murder, and hours-long fist fights.

"Chelsea has a fascinating history," said King. "Much of the past has been forgotten, but this tour will tell the sto-

ries of legal and illegal drinking, tavern escapades, the temperance movement and prohibition, and how the landscape and demand for alcohol morphed into today's sensibility."

King said that, at times, the rules and regulations were less stringent, but sometimes state politicians, like Frank Glazier, took a local and strong hand in solving the drinking and gambling problems of their era.

CAHS board president and Chelsea native, Jan Bernath, recalls the "bar scene" growing up in the 1940s and '50s.

Seitz's on West Middle Street was the only bar ever in town," said Bernath. "When the idea came up to develop a historic pub crawl, I was all in. I'm thrilled with the new tour and the stories and secrets behind Chelsea's familiar storefronts that are still standing."

Because much of the walking event takes

place in the city's social district, the tour includes stops for beverages. Walkers will be able to stroll with their beverage of choice.
